Who said all leisure vacations need to be, well, leisurely? Whether it's sea kayaking in Los Cabos or cooking traditional meals with locals in Morocco, sometimes you want to ditch the lounge chair and *do* something more. Your travel advisor can craft customizable itineraries with cruise, hotel, tour, and destination partners who

specialize in authentic experiences, and who are committed to sustainable tourism practices in the communities and regions you visit. Immerse yourself in dramatic destinations, connect with fascinating cultures, commune with nature, or get moving on a multisport expedition.

Life's an adventure – and it's time to explore.



The last place on earth tops a lot of travelers' bucket lists. If you want to cross the Antarctic Circle, **Quark Expeditions** – which has been charting the poles since 1991 – offers journeys ranging from ten days to three weeks. Sign on with **Australis** for a shorter trip; the Patagonia cruise specialist provides one- to three-day add-ons to the White Continent. **Lindblad Expeditions** is the only operator in Antarctica with an undersea specialist qualified to dive in polar waters. An accompanying remotely operated vehicle gives guests a rare look at the Antarctic underworld from depths of up to 1,000 feet.



Bis for BAJA

Whether you're sea kayaking or savoring ceviche in a secret-garden courtyard, **Los Cabos** caters to all the senses. Cabo San Lucas' hotels, shops, and restaurants are a beach-stroll away from granite islands and secret coves; the colonial San José del Cabo is home base for Mexican culture, towering cardon cacti, and a freshwater coastal lagoon that's home to hundreds of bird species. Dive into Baja's salty side with **UnCruise Adventures**, which charters the Sea of Cortés year-round. Gray whales star in the early months, while whale sharks make their appearance after November.



The tactician of active adventures, **Backroads** offers a range of impeccably organized trips for everyone from families and beginners seeking a gentle pedal, all the way up to iron-quadded mountain scalers. Trips span the world, with additional routes added frequently (new biking itineraries for 2017 include Bermuda, Maine, and Provence). Canada-based Butterfield & Robinson also offers family cycling trips in adventurous locales such as Cambodia; custom and self-guided routes let travelers set their own pace, from Chile to China.



is for **DOWN UNDER**

Australia, mate: Surf the Gold Coast, sip Margaret River wines, and fly over the Bungle Bungles. The Outback calls explorers inward, to the Aboriginal culture of Alice Springs and Uluru, while pearls, opera, and Asian night markets beckon from Sydney. In Darwin, delve into Oceania's military past with Mat McLachlan Battlefield Tours. The journalist and historian is the leading expert in ANZAC (Australia and New Zealand Army Corps) history and culture; in 2017 he leads six-day Darwin tours marking the 75th anniversary of the year WWII reached Australia's shores.






Arrive by helicopter to the brilliant snowy surface of New Zealand's Franz Josef Glacier or boat beneath the country's Tasman Glacier in the shadow of Mount Cook. In a land renowned for emerald hills, fluffy sheep, and a rich native culture, these ice giants of the south are not to be missed. Oceania specialist Southern World can get you walking on Fox Glacier, sailing in Auckland Harbour, or winetasting on Waiheke Island.

is for **EASTER ISLAND**

On Rapa Nui, aka Easter Island, explora's LEED-certified hotel is built in harmony with the land and the Pacific. The South American specialist's 30-room sanctuary impedes on none of the famous architec-




Tauck Bridges connects family members of all ages to 19 destinations from Tanzania to Ireland, and provides familyonly river cruising in Europe that keeps kids engaged while adults float to their dream destinations. One of our favorite places for a multigenerational adventure: Vancouver, British Columbia. Adults are already familiar with this culturally rich city, and children will get a rise out of the Capilano Suspension Bridge and revel at Granville Island, North America's largest free water park. For winter fun, the enormous Whistler Blackcomb ski resort is just a couple hours' drive away.











is for INDIA

Though Micato Safaris started more than 50 years ago in Kenya, its history goes all the way back to Goa, where the founding Pinto family has roots. Today, Micato creates bespoke journeys, from three-day immersions in Varanasi, the Hindu soul of India, to a 13-day temple-studded Northern Indian retrospective. India specialist Greaves Tours extends its expertise to Sri Lanka and the Maldives; the company's mainland lineup includes Central India, an oft-missed area where Kipling's creatures still roam and Buddhism was born some 2,600 years ago.

is for JOIE D'VIVRE!

Of course you'll love sailing the Mediterranean, Alaska, or the Caribbean aboard Ponant's yachts. But life aboard France's only cruise line might surprise you with echoes of your favorite Parisian hotel: French chefs and gastronomy set the tone, with extra touches such as baked goods from Maison Lenôtre. The all-French crew will make sure your Pierre Frey linens are pressed and the L'Occitane bath supplies stocked.

is for KRUGER

Home to 19 national parks, South Africa is synonymous with adventure. One of our favorite ways to find it: aboard the country's renowned Blue Train, which whisks passengers between Cape Town and Pretoria in its elegant lacquered cars throughout the week, and, since 2016, to Kruger National Park via special biannual routes. Among the biggest national parks in the world, Kruger shelters more species of mammals than any other park in Africa. Daily flights from Johannesburg and Cape Town also make it one of the most accessible.



At the geographic heart of Switzerland, Lake Lucerne has ambling branches that radiate deep into verdant Alpine valleys. Tour by sailboat in the summer, or take up residence in the historic and hip city of Lucerne, where you can explore waterfalls, mineral baths, and endless miles of wildflower-flanked hiking trails.





is for MEKONG

For centuries the shared lifeblood of Southeast Asia, the Mekong River now faces an uncertain future, as hydropower projects threaten its ecosystems and vitality. To help preserve this historic waterway, **Aqua Expeditions** carries no more than 40 guests through Cambodia and Vietnam aboard its modern *Aqua Mekong* river-cruiser, whose interior is built of local and sustainable materials, and features comforts such as an outdoor pool and spa. Discover the cultures that thrive along the river with stops in top sites such as Angkor and Ho Chi Minh City.





NORTHERN LIGHTS

In Iceland, the swirling alien-greens and milky blues of the aurora borealis are an "ordinary" part of the night sky during most of the year. Iceland Encounter's five-day tours include glaciers and waterfalls, volcanoes and geysers; overnights in Thorsmork Wilderness Area and Thingvellir National Park provide optimal dark-sky viewing of the northern lights.



is for PERU

The ancient Inca homeland is a thoroughly modern destination. Trekking, camping, and glamping options abound for travelers making their way from Cusco to the ruins at Machu Picchu, while the Belmond Hiram Bingham train remains the preeminent way to access the Incan citadel in style, either as a day trip or as part of Belmond's fiveday Peru experience. In the capital of Lima - also widely recognized as South America's culinary capital – a four-day gastronomic tour from Lima Tours delves into a fusion cuisine that draws on indigenous, Chinese, African, and Japanese influences.

is for QUITO

Ecuador's capital is inherently superlative:
At 9,350 feet, it's the world's highest
official capital; it's also the closest to
the equator. What's more, its beautifully
preserved Old Town was among the first
UNESCO World Heritage sites. Ladatco Tours'
22-day Ecuadoran immersion starts with two nights
in the city before embarking into the indigenous
cultures and precious ecosystems of the Andes
and Amazon. With International Expeditions, a
Galápagos Islands sailing aboard the 32-passenger
Evolution can be extended with three days in

is for RANGE ROVER

This boxy hero of the safari is one beast you're sure to spot in Africa's landscape. **Big Five Tours & Expeditions**' 14-day Tanzania trips take in the wild Serengeti as well as the Mahale Mountains for chimp viewing. **Abercrombie & Kent**, which blazed the trail for luxury African safaris in the 1960s, offers a classic Kenyan safari in the Masai Mara. In Botswana's Okavango Delta, **African Travel, Inc.** will get you on the water during a four-day paddle on the Selinda Canoe Trail, a waterway born of heavy rains in 2009.



The best travel is all about connections – to people, places, and our world. Case in point: **Heritage Tours Private Travel**'s customizable Morocco itineraries, which can include experiences like curated cooking lessons with a *dada* (Moroccan grandmother) in her family kitchen. The company also provides special access in sub-Saharan Africa, plus Spain, Portugal, Greece, and Turkey. In northern Europe, **Norwegian Adventures**' approach is both tightly organized and totally laid back, whether you want to hang out at a remote farm or grill your catch of the day in a fjord-side *rorbu* cabin. For those of Viking descent, the company offers genealogical research and family tracking.



The United Nations has designated 2017 as The Year of Sustainable Tourism, and Virtuoso is proud to work with tour operators who lead the way in responsible travel. Among them: G Adventures, which takes travelers to nearly 100 countries, with a core value of giving back to communities and ecosystems, and with strong animal welfare standards. Natural Habitat Adventures is the first carbon-neutral travel company and it partners with the World Wildlife Fund in trip planning and guide training. In New Mexico and southern Colorado, Ted Turner Expeditions invites guests into the private ranches of the philanthropist-billionaire, whose passions run from conservation to nuclear arms eradication.



Aboard the Rocky Mountaineer, the Canadian Rockies are the backdrop to eight- or nine-day rail journeys that wind their way over seven snowcapped mountain ranges, stopping each night at stunning hotels. Further on, Knightly Tours is your gateway to Alaska. With 45 years of experience in the state, Knightly excels at crafting tours around niche tastes - eight different tours, for instance, specialize in bear viewing. To go as far north as the planet allows, Arctic Kingdom Expeditions takes you "comfortably out of your comfort zone," to get up close to walruses and polar bears, and deep into Arctic Circle communities.

is for WILD WEST

The canyons and rifts of the American West will always call to road trippers and adventure seekers. **National Parks Revealed** offers another side of well-known parks, such as the birdlife of Glacier and the best photo-ops in Yellowstone. They'll also help you uncover lesser-known parks such as Utah's Capitol Reef. National Park packages from **Austin Adventures** include family-friendly vacations and active adults-only multisport trips, such as a hike/bike/raft adventure in Oregon's Crater Lake National Park.



In the vast wilds of Central Asia, hardy and portable yurts (*gers*) are frequently the lodging of choice. **Zegrahm Expeditions**' 17-day Mongolia adventure has you sleeping in the round by night and riding Bactrian camels, making dumplings, and watching archery competitions at the national Naadam Festival by day. **Remote Lands**' camping itineraries in Tajikistan's Murghab District also take you well off the beaten path, to Rangkul Lake and the 15,000-foot Ak-Baital Pass.



Beaches, Bora-Bora, and bungalows: French Polynesia can't help but be passionate. While sailing with **Paul Gauguin Cruises**, island idylls are your playground during 8- to 15-day cruises; on board, a sarong-wrapped, flower-crowned Tahitian vow renewal keeps love burning brightly. Founded in 1987 and operated by an Aussie-American husband-and-wife team, **Swain Destinations** can uncover romance all over the world, from secluded cabins in the wilds of New Zealand to Champagne toasts in Namibia's sand dunes.



is for ZAMBEZI

The river that makes the renowned "smoke" of Victoria Falls is the soul of Zambia and

The Royal Livingstone Anantara. Each of the hotel's 173 rooms features a private veranda with views of the thundering main attraction. Before high tea is served, go river cruising in search of the "big five," or raft the rapids at Bakota Gorge.



BY FOOT

Acadia National Park, Maine

"For a nice hike, follow the Bar
Island Trail, a 'land bridge' from
behind the Bar Harbor Club that
takes you out to the island. The
hour-long hike offers great views
of Bar Harbor. Make sure to plan

SAFARI STRATEGY

When it comes to life-altering travel experiences, an **African safari** is in a league of its own. "Visiting Africa opens your heart in a way that is totally unexpected," says advisor Phoebe Weinberg of Grosse Pointe Farms, Michigan. But because each destination is unique and suits a different style of traveler, it's important to study your options, she notes. Which safari is right for you? Here are three key categories to consider.



FOR YOUR FIRST SAFARI

For the most impactful and rewarding experience, Botswana and South Africa top the list with an array of small, intimate camps for every budget, says Weinberg. Two must-dos: a canoe ride along Botswana's Okavango Delta at sunset, and South Africa's Kruger National Park – "a consistent source of the 'big five.' "

BEST TIME TO VISIT:

Prime game viewing occurs from late April through early October and late November through December.



FOR FAMILIES WITH YOUNG KIDS

While the majority of African game camps provide children's activities, and many now feature connecting family accommodations, **Kenya and Tanzania** have the added plus of **local Masai** tribes that children can interact with during village visits.

WORTH NOTING:

Those concerned about malaria should consider South Africa, which offers camps in **malaria-free zones**.



FOR SEASONED SAFARI-GOERS

For those ready to go beyond the game experience, "so many more African wonders await," says Weinberg. Just a few ideas: exploring Namibia's **Skeleton Coast**, learning ancient skills from the Bushmen in the Kalahari Desert, and spending a day with the **remote Pokot tribe** in northern Kenya.

EXTREME AFRICA:

For extra adrenaline, she adds, try snorkeling with sharks in Zanzibar or white-water rafting at Victoria Falls along the border of Zambia and Zimbabwe.



BEYOND BASIC

Three ways to explore the wide and wonderful world of sustainable travel now. BY COSTAS CHRIST

TODAY, TAKING A SUSTAINABLE holiday comes in as many forms as a traveler's imagination can conjure, from dining on farm-to-fork fare in treehouse-style villas to photographing thriving wildlife on 250,000 acres of formerly denuded farmland. The following travel experiences share a common bond: They protect threatened habitats, support cultural heritage, and improve local livelihoods – and also make for great vacations.

Snow Leopard Quest

Among the world's critically endangered big cats, snow leopards are so rare that finding a paw print in the wild is considered an important discovery. This year, Mongolia's government signed off on the creation of a new nature reserve – Tost Tosonbumba. Located in South Gobi, in a region considered prime snow leopard habitat, the reserve will connect two other conservation areas to establish one of the largest protected snow leopard landscapes on the planet. Big-cat lovers have the chance to track – and possibly spot – these mysterious felines.

Habitat Heroes

Starting in September, South Africa's UNESCO-designated Cape Floral Region bursts into a brilliant display of south-of the-equator springtime, showcasing the world's greatest concentration of plant species – more than are found in the Amazon rain forest – and carpeting the rugged terrain with rainbows of color. This biodiversity-rich habitat is home to endangered wildlife such as the Cape Mountain zebra.

Flower Power in Peru

Over the past half-century, the rush for tourism dollars from waves of visitors eager to see Machu Picchu's ruins meant the sanctuary's natural heritage received scant attention – and area flora and fauna spiraled into decline. Enter a hotel whose mission is to create a sustainable tourism model that protects and restores nature, rather than tramples it.


